Annabelle Forest was just seven years old when she was inducted into a twisted sex cult by her own mother. But Annabelle's story was far from over - she had to adjust to a new life away from the rules and rituals of the cult. Today she lives a happy and settled life with Emily and her partner but the nightmares of her damaged past will haunt her forever.
